CEPT: a brief history



- European Conference of Postal and Telecommunications Administrations
- Established in 1959 to co-ordinate state-owned telecoms and postal organisations
- Has grown from 19 countries to 46





An internal and external focus

- Internally, CEPT develops harmonised policies and regulations for electronic communications (notably spectrum and numbering plan management) and post
- Externally, CEPT coordinates members' engagement with the ITU (and UPU) and has relationships with equivalent regional bodies globally, as well as other partners














Structure of CEPT and correspondence to ITU



- Three autonomous committees and a co-presidency
- Supported by ECO
- Com-ITU responsible for all ITU engagement except ITU-R



What we do...

- Committee for ITU Policy organises CEPT's ITU engagement for all activities except WRC/ITU-R
- Prepares European Common Proposals and coordinates members' positions for the PP, WTDC, WTSA (and their inter-regional preparation)
- Plays a role (alongside other RTOs) in communicating European views to the ITU governing Council
- PTs on ITU-T and D have broadened their activity to Study Groups and other sectoral meetings
- Propose to establish PTs for PP26 earlier than usual to enable strategic preparation through C25, C26

Observations

- Increased activity of, and participation in Com-ITU
- Co-ordination has to be multi-dimensional
- Objectives are largely aligned
 but strength in diversity
- Greater potential for CEPT to develop a distinctive European voice





Electronic Communications Committee (ECC)

The ECC considers and develops policies on electronic communications activities in European context, taking account of European and international legislation and regulations. The primary objective of the ECC is to enable the efficient, effective and harmonised use of the radio spectrum, satellite orbits and numbering resources across Europe

Mission

- develops common policies and regulations
 for Europe
- considers European and International legislation
- prepares European Common Proposals to represent European interests in international organisations, especially in the ITU
- provide a focal point for information
- cooperates with other bodies
